McComb: A Certified Community

Our journey began August 2011. We had our first coalition meeting. We were well on our way with no money- just a mission to get 0-5 year olds ready for kindergarten.

Throughout these soon to be two years, we lost a couple of steering committee members, but gained some strong ones. All in all, our steering committee has been faithful. We have had a monthly meetings from August 2011 to present—truly committed to making this certification happen.

As funds go, we depended on inkind services. The McComb School District has been our life line. They provided us with a resource house, renovating it inside and out. They have included our childcare providers in trainings. We have been allowed to participate in the myOn computer program-giving children the opportu-

nity to read books online. Junior Auxiliary of McComb cleaned the resource house, painted rooms and provided blinds for every window. We did have an unexpected donation of \$250 from Southwest Community College and \$300 from a class reunion group. We stretched every dollar.



As word got out in our community about Excel by 5, we have had church groups, educational organizations and retired persons volunteering their services and providing necessary items for our resource house. I know this will continue because the calls keep coming asking what needs to be

done.

One of our biggest challenges was how we were going to get funding. We decided to go the route of applying for 501(c)3 status because the opportunity for grant writing and not being tied to the McComb School District and their regulations. In August 2012 we applied for the status with the help of a local accountant. In May 2013, we received the 501(c)3 status.

Now the stage is set to begin grant writing, have regular hours at the resource house and welcome young children to our library at the resource house. Childcare centers will begin visiting the resource house on a regular basis. Parent trainings will be scheduled. This is an exciting time in our city!

Indianola: Providing Capacity Building for Child Care Providers

Through a partnership with the Delta Health Alliance (DHA) Indianola Promise Community (IPC) and the Mississippi Low Income Child Care Initiative (MLICCI), eight childcare providers in Indianola are receiving technical assistance to build their capacity and improve quality of care. Nineteen child care staff are in the process of receiving their CDAs. Also through this partnership resources are being made available to improve their environment in response to the Infant **Toddler Environmental Rating**

Scale (ITERS)and Early Childhood Environmental Rating Scale (ECERS). Karen Blumenberg, technical assistant provider with MLICCI, states, "I am seeing centers and staff transform before my eyes". This partnership is made possible through funding from the W.K. Kellogg Foundation. Funding from the W.K. Kellogg Foundation has also afforded Indianola with the opportunity to establish the Indianola Promise Community Early Education Collaborative where a number of local and state early childhood experts

work together to offer a comprehensive approach to early learning services.

Our committee worked very hard the last three months to put together an awards dinner for our child care directors! We all felt the need to acknowledge the work our directors have done to help us meet certification.

It started with an idea I remembered from working with directors in Florida where each year those directors were honored with a dinner (or luncheon) and given awards for achievement. It was always a "dressed up time" that gave directors a chance to be with other directors and feel proud of the accomplishments of their center.

Our committee liked the idea and

we began to strategize how we could do that here. After several planning meetings we decided to have the event in the fellowship hall at a local church, using their real china and silverware. We set up the tables with white tablecloths and decorated with colored streamers and children's toys in the middle of each table. (They would be part of the take home donations for each center after it was over.)

Without much money for food we asked McAllister's for tea and lemonade (they donated) and each committee member brought something related to an "Italian" theme. We had hors d'oeuvres, lasagna, salads and plenty of garlic bread. For dessert, we were able to cut a delicious cake donated by Lusa Bakery into big pieces.

The evening started with guests visiting with one another at arrival. We opened with a welcome and introductions, and then called each director up to receive a certificate of appreciation. As they

came forward we talked about how their center had completed certain criteria that had helped our community become certified (some had received more staff development hours, some more teachers with CDA or higher and many that had agreed to a program evaluation).

As the meal began we heard from a speaker (Dr. Maxine Harper) who gave an inspiring talk about what a person in her life had done to make such a difference. Some of the listeners got teary eyed hearing about how Maxine had overcome such obstacles in her life, because she was taught to believe in herself!

We ended the program after dessert and all left with new sets of cardboard blocks and "little people" for their block centers as thank you gifts from the coalition. The committee stayed to clean up and shared the mutual feeling that this was something we wanted to do every year!

While taking care of business during the June Excel By 5 Coalition meeting, the coalition stuffed new baby bags for families in Indianola. The bag consists of information on: Excel By 5, development stages of a child's life from birth to 5, resources available to families in Indianola and a baby's first book. Packets were distributed to the Parents as Teachers program, the Chamber of Commerce, Mississippi Childcare Resource and Referral Network, Supporting Partnerships to As-

sure Ready Kids (SPARK) and The Mississippi Low Income Child Care Initiative for distribution. Mayor Steve Rosenthal serves as chair of the Indianola Excel By 5 Coalition. He said, "The bags will be provided to families with new babies and to families moving into Indianola with children ages birth to five".

The young mother's and mothersto-be were presented with two books to help them through the first year of their newborn's life. CCC Excel By 5 plans to continue meeting with these mothers throughout the summer offering them information about child CPR and child development.

Central Clarke County: New Guidelines Provide Early Support for Common Core Submitted by: Elisa Mayo, Steering Committee member

New education standards for 3and 4-year olds have been developed to bring cohesion among early child care providers and the start of formal schooling, also known as kindergarten. The Mississippi Department of Education will issue the new guidelines and the accompanying scaffolding by the fall of 2013. These standards will allow for early child care providers to understand what is expected of children as early as the first day of kindergarten regardless of what kindergarten the child may attend.

Dr. Penny Wallin, Assistant Professor of Educational Leadership at MSU, was a guest speaker for the Central Clarke County Excel By 5 Educational Partner's meeting in May. Dr. Wallin served on the committee preparing the new 3- and 4- year old guidelines. Wallin states, "The standards mirror many of the Common Core Standards for Kindergarten. The words 'with prompting and support' are added to most standards simply showing that this is the beginning of learning that skill."

Wallin's discussion also suggested a focus on social and emotional development as being paramount to successful educational gains. "It is estimated there is one conflict per minute in a early child care center, which makes it impossible to prepare students," Wallin said. "The use of conscious discipline can set the tone for handling social problems quickly." Conscious discipline works on developing discipline within a child rather than applying discipline to them. It also allows teachers to become proactive instead of reactive when conflict arises.

Each of the developmental domains deserves special attention as teachers of young children work to build a foundation for lifelong learning. Educational partner's meetings like this are a great way to bring these teachers together, all focused on that common goal. PAGE 4 EXCEL By 5

Lee County: Certification Underway

After being approved as a candidate community last October, the Lee County coalition is gearing up for its current year events. In April, we held our community update/town hall meetings. Since our county encompasses such a large area, we wanted to reach as many different groups as possible. We decided to hold three meetings in different locations throughout the county. All meetings were held the week of April 15, at Saltillo Primary School (Saltillo), Verona Elementary School (Verona), and Milam Elementary (Tupelo). Different members of the coalition opened each meeting with discussion on brain development in the early years and the importance of education during this time. Beverly Williams, Lee County Certification Manager, then discussed the background of Excel By 5, the survey results, and the actions that would be taken to address each of the issues. We also gave the audience a chance to provide

feedback. We posted large sheets of paper on the wall and wrote the most common survey responses to the question, "How could the community work better to support families of young children?" Each audience member was given three sticker dots, and was told to place their dot next to the answer they most agreed with, or to write their own response. We wrapped up each meeting with a question and answer session and pizza and drinks for everyone.

We are one of many agencies who worked with the Lee County 4th District Development Group to put on a workshop for teen moms. This was held on Saturday, June 15, at the Springhill Baptist Association. We had about 20 teen moms attend this all-day workshop. Breakout sessions included: Nutrition/Proper Care, Infant/Child Development Stages, Importance of Wellness Checkups, Need for Early Literacy, Discipline, Safety (including car seat checks), and Educational Options for Teen Moms. Each participant received resource materials and a diaper bag loaded with supplies. Lee County Excel By 5 presented a breakout session on the Importance of Reading and Early Literacy and gave each participant a book.

Our school readiness event was held in conjunction the United Way's School Supply Giveaway on July 20, 2013. This event was held at the mall before it opened, and our coalition had its own area dedicated to school readiness activities for preschoolers. We worked with our group of kindergarten teachers and early care providers to come up with the activities.

Our first family event is scheduled for Saturday, September 14, and will be held at Ballard Park in conjunction with the annual Touch a Truck event, where children are allowed to touch, climb on, and explore large trucks and machinery. We will have numerous activities for children, including inflatables, story time, obstacle course, and face painting. Our resource center will be there with samples of educational materials that can be checked out. We will provide goody bags to the families with information about agencies, our new family resource guide, and wristbands and giveaways for the kids.



We are looking forward to the rest of 2013!

Biloxi: Biloxi Excel By 5 Received \$10,000 from the IP Casino Resort Spa

The IP CASINO RESORT SPA promotes and supports the positive development of youth, education, arts, health, social and civic programs which contribute to a higher quality of life within the communities of the greater Gulf Coast region. The charitable focus of the IP CASINO RESORT SPA encourages project and program development and demonstrates the strategic partnerships between community/business leaders and organizations that make a positive difference in the lives of youth.

The Biloxi Excel By 5 Coalition submitted an application and was awarded a \$10,000 grant on March 8, 2013. The monies received by the coalition will help with a program entitled "Teaching Tots on Tuesday". The classes will be held bi-monthly or monthly for children (ages 3 – 4) and parents. The goals and objectives are given to parents prior to registration. The parents must preregister as the class is limited to 10 children/parents or caregivers.

Lessons are developed based on the Common Core Standards in the areas of Language Arts and Mathematics. Following the academic lesson, a snack is provided for the children. The morning activity concludes with an art lesson or activity for the children.

Parents will receive a folder with the Common Core Standards, the skills lesson, list of toy lending library resource materials supporting the skills taught and the directional explanation for the art activity. The children will receive an educational activity/game or book that reinforces the skills taught. This permits parents to have designated materials to work with their child at home and reinforce the skills taught at "Teaching Tots on Tuesday".

Monies received from the IP CA-SINO RESORT SPA grant will be used to purchase educational materials for parents for "Teaching Tots on Tuesday", books for educational workshops, and books for children at events such as the Health Fair, Safety Fair, Come Learn with Santa, Trip to Wonderland, Count Down to Readiness Fair, and Hop the Trail to Bunny Land.

The Mississippi Early Learning Standards for Classrooms serving Three and Four Year-Old Children is organized according to the following areas: English Language Arts, Mathematics, Approaches to Learning, Social and Emotional Development, Science, Physical Development, Creative Expression and Social Studies.

The English Language Arts and Mathematics Standards were developed to correlate to the Common Core State Standards for Mathematics and English Language Arts. The Approaches to Learning, Social and Emotional Development, Science, Physical Development, Creative Expression and Social Studies Standards were developed based on National Standards for Early Childhood Education.

Biloxi: Third Annual Countdown to School Readiness Fair

The third annual "Count Down to Kindergarten Readiness Fair" was held April 25th at Lopez School with approximately 50 children attending. The fair was sponsored by Biloxi Public Schools, City of Biloxi and Biloxi Excel By 5. Parents with children 5 years old on or before September 1, 2013, were encouraged to attend the free event.



Upon registering, parents received a "Countdown to Kindergarten Readiness Fair" stamp card. Children and parents who visited 10 or more designated activities had their cards stamped. At the end of the Readiness Fair, pre-schoolers received booklets designed by Biloxi Excel By 5 and Biloxi Public Schools: Count Down To Kindergarten Readiness Fair; School Bus Activity: Food Service: Hand Washing Procedures: Nutrition Tips. Playground Information and commercially prepared materials: My First Day of School is Near: Get Wild about Reading; and Making Move to Kindergarten. The preschoolers also received a box of

24 colors, scissors and a glue stick.

Participating elementary schools were Cedar Lake Christian Academy, Gorenflo, Jeff Davis, Nativity BVM, North Bay, Our Lady of Fatima and Popp's Ferry. The schools were assigned designated activities such as: Syllable Count, Number Recognition, Sequence, Fine Motor, Color Recognition, Alphabet Recognition, and Shape Recognition. Children had the opportunity to visit a classroom and utilize the playground equipment on campus. Children selected a "free" library book and were fingerprinted by the Biloxi Police Department.



Other opportunities included: boarding a school bus, learning about bus safety, visiting the playground, visiting a classroom, learning hand washing procedures, visiting the school cafeteria, going through the serving line, selecting food items of their choice, and seeing how lunch numbers are keyed into the cafeteria PIN pad.






